O What Evil is War

War and Peace in 17th Century Germany Workshop for Voices and Instruments *Directed by Gawain Glenton* 10.00am - 5.00pm Saturday 25th June 2016

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Easebourne Priory, near Midhurst, West Sussex

A workshop exploring music written during the Thirty Years War (1618-1648) composed by Germanspeaking musicians directly affected by the conflict. Then as now, anti-war sentiment found an outlet in music, with beautifully poignant songs of loss, anguish and thanksgiving for peace being set to music by composers such as Heinrich Schütz, Melchior Franck, Johann Staden and Sigmund Theophil Staden. In this time of conflict this music reminds us that the brutality of war - and the simple human response to it - remains unchanged from that day to this.

This workshop is suitable for singers, cornetts, sackbuts, dulcians/curtals, viol and violin family instruments and plucked continuo. Soft winds, including recorder players are also welcome (especially alto, tenor, bass), but should be prepared to sing and/or play another instrument some of the time. The pitch will be A440.

Fee: £15 for members of SEMF and other Early Music Fora, £21 for non members, £10 for under 25s. Please send your cheque, made out to 'Southern Early Music Forum', with the application form by June 11th. Late booking surcharge £2 after 11th June. Acceptance is subject to musical balance.



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Gawain Glenton is a cornetto player whose work as a soloist and an ensemble musician will be well known to many. He is a member of The English Cornett & Sackbut Ensemble and many other period instrument groups. Gawain's expertise in the field of ornamenting early music makes him increasingly in demand as a coach for both singers and instrumentalists. His experience as a professional singer and player of reed instruments and recorders makes him a highly versatile musician, at home in the rich musical world of the 16th and 17th centuries. Gawain also enjoys expanding the repertoire of the cornetto, by performing new and challenging contemporary music, and by working with musicians from the rock, pop and folk worlds. He has recently enrolled at Southampton University to begin a doctoral study of Italian diminution treatises.

The Southern Early Music Forum is one of 9 regional groups encouraging the enjoyment of early music. Our members include singers, instrumentalists, and researchers, beginners and experts, amateurs and professionals. We organise 8 -10 workshops and other events each year in our region.
